Response to Buenos Aires Article in V22N1

I read with great interest the article by Louis Laflamme in Volume 22 Nr 1. He mentions the quantities issued.

What I can share is an inventory that was made by Victor Kneitschel, who was a leading Stamp dealer and editor/publisher of a specialized catalog of Argentina. The 1958 edition of this catalog is a particularly important reference for those collecting stamps of Buenos Aires.

Kneitschel did an inventory of the stamps of Buenos Aires in 1958 with all known collectors who had these stamps in their collections. The result: a total 6,180 Barquitos stamps [quantities for individual stamps deleted].

I also have a copy of the publication "The Postage Stamps of Buenos Aires" (a privately printed circulation of only 100 copies) by F. J. Peplow in 1925, London. One of the major collectors of BA stamps at that time made a reprint of the BA stamps and provided them to Mr. Peplow to illustrate his publication. I sent a copy of this publication to the APRL (American Philatelic Reference Library). [The RPSL (Royal Philatelic Society) in London also has a copy.]

On page 24, Peplow shares his account of the stamps that was made by Gibbons Stamp Monthly (28 May 1910) by Mr. C. J. Phillips. The total = 954 stamps. Phillips gathered his data from owners of the five largest collections of Buenos Aires at that time.

I feel that the inventory by V. Kneitschel in 1958 is more complete as he had access to most of the BA collectors at that time.

I have been very interested in the Barquitos of Buenos Aires since the 2008 Siegel auction of the Islander Collection. I wrote an article for the APS, American Philatelist that was included in the December 2013 issue, pages 1128 - 1131. *[Ed: This article was cited in a follow-up in V22N2.]*

Oldenburg Forgery

[Regarding the Oldenburg forgery described in V22N4]... one noteworthy thing is that the "2" in the forgery resembles the "2" in genuine Type III much more than it does the "2" in Types I and II. However, the forgery fails in the other points: the top of the "1" in 1/30 does not reach the ermine (that word must have come from the German handbooks) and the forgery has a period after "Oldenburg" missing in all three of the genuine types.

I think the illustrations for types I and II on numonesidentifier.com (which are from the Minkus 1980 catalog) are reversed from the order that Rev. Earee describes them. I just noticed that today. I will stick with Minkus illustrations for now; Rev. Earee does not have illustrations.

Proposed FICC Service of Offering #1 Opinions

Here are what I propose to be the operating guidelines for an FICC Examination Service. Please share any comments on this proposal, and the FICC Board will discuss everything before deciding whether to implement this service. The Board's decision will be published in V23N2.

- Opinions will be provided free of charge to FICC members in good standing.
- Opinions may be requested on the following:
 - o Genuine versus forged stamps
 - o Genuine versus forged cancelations
 - Differentiation of #1 versus other legitimate catalogue #s
- At this time, opinions will not be provided on overprints, color varieties, or on reprints versus original printings
- Opinions on grade, centering or soundness will not be provided. However, obvious faults will be described in the opinion.
- No guarantees or warranties are provided with the opinions.
- Opinions can be requested by electronic submission of stamp images from flat-bed scanners provided the scans have a resolution of 300 dpi or higher (600 dpi is preferable as this allows for enlargement of the scan while preserving details).
- If not submitting electronically, the actual stamp must be submitted by mail. Do not send photocopies as the resolution is not sufficient. Stamps will be returned using standard postal mail unless other arrangements are requested (and paid for) by the submitter.

Wallis & Futuna – A Country with Only One ATM

"Collectors with a fondness for the French Colonies enjoy the stamps of Wallis and Futuna, a small group of volcanic islands in the South Pacific between Samoa and Fiji.

"The islands cover less than 60 square miles. People make a living by growing coconuts, raising pigs, fishing, and collecting subsidies from the French government.

"Tourism is virtually non-existent. There is 1 bank and 1 ATM.

"Less than 1,200 people live in the islands' largest city, Mata-Utu, where there are no street names. To find the post office, head for the wharf.

"The territory's first stamps were released in 1920. [Editor: Wallis & Futuna #1 is shown at left, 200%.] They were overprints of the long running New Caledonia stamps of 1905-28.

"In 1944, the first Wallis and Futuna stamps were released. The set of 14 depicted Ivi Poo, a local bone carving in a tiki design. [Editor note: The 1944 stamps were the first issues with "Wallis & Futuna" appearing in the stamp design rather than as an overprint. Wallis and Futuna remained a French Protectorate/Territory.]"

Poland's Government in Exile

"During World War II, Poland's Government in Exile was on the move.

"Following the German invasion, it set up shop in Paris, and then in Angers, France, before moving to London. By this time, most of the Polish Navy destroyers and two submarines were in Great Britain.

"Between December, 1941 and February, 1945, Poland's Government in Exile released 21 stamps. [Editor: Scott #3K1 is shown at right, 200%.]

"This was not simply a publicity stunt. Poland operated an intelligence service, which played a major role in breaking German codes. It's Navy and Air Force each made significant contributions to the war effort.

"The Government in Exile stamps were highly sought after, sold out quickly, and were valid for postage when mail was sent from Polish ships and Polish military camps in Great Britain.

"In accordance with international law, which ruled that Polish ships were indeed Polish territory, these stamps had the blessing of British postal officials. There were also situations where the British allowed these stamps to be used on mail sent from Great Britain by members of the Polish Army and Air Force.

"The designs mirror pre-war Polish stamps. The final stamp issued commemorated the Warsaw Uprising of 1944.

"In July, 1945, British, American, and French governments withdrew official recognition of Poland's Government in Exile in London. Diplomatic recognition shifted to the Russian-run 'Polish Provisional Government of National Unity.'

"Long after World War II, and long after its last stamps had been issued, the exile government plodded on, throughout the Cold War years. When Soviet rule over Poland came to an end in 1989, it was still meeting every two weeks in London."

Hadhramaut Stamps: Change in Government First Issue or Not?

Perhaps members of FICC are much more aware of the history and geography of South Arabia than I am, but I obtained a lot of interesting information about this in an article by Christer Brunstrom published in the March/April 2008 edition of Global Stamp News (no longer in publication). The article by Mr Brunson is entitled Philately from Hadhramaut and appears on pages 30-31 of the GSN periodical. The article contains much more information than I provide below, so interested FICC members are encouraged to obtain their own copy for a better explanation.

The British had ruled the port city of Aden for quite some time, and used the stamps of India for postage in that area. The interior area surrounding Aden was called the Aden Protectorate – and was divided into the Eastern Protectorate and the Western Protectorate.

The Western Protectorate was comprised of a group of small tribal districts. The Eastern Protectorate also had a few small tribes, but was mainly ruled by three large families – the Kathiri family, the Qu'aiti family, and the Mahra Sultanate. The Kathiri family ruled the cities of Seiyun and Tarim. The Qu'aiti family was located in the coastal cities of Shihr and Mukalla but ruled over the much larger region known as the Hadhramaut. The Mahra family ruled the cities of Qishn and Socotra.

In 1937, the Federation of South Arabia was formed by the port of Aden joining with the sheikdoms, emirates, and sultanates of the Western Aden Protectorate. Aden's first stamps were issued in

April, 1937 and were used throughout the Eastern and Western Protectorates (Scott #1, 125% is shown above). As the area became more affluent with trade and oil, the Kathiri and Qu'aiti sultans felt that their states deserved their own stamps. Independent stamps for these areas were first issued in 1942 – in the middle of World War II. These are listed in the Scott Catalogues as the Kathiri State of Seiyun (Sc#1-11) and the Qu'aiti State of



Shihr and Mukalla (Sc#1-11), both appearing under the heading of Aden. Although the Kathiri and Qu'aiti State stamps are imprinted with their specific names, all of these stamps were valid for use throughout the entire Aden Protectorate. The Sc#1 stamps of both sets are shown at right, 125%.

In 1955, the name appearing on the Qu'aiti stamps changed to Qu'aiti State in Hadhramaut (Sc#29-40) to better reflect that the Qu'aiti family ruled over the much larger area of Hadhramaut rather than just the two cities of Shihr and Mukalla. Sc#29 from this set is shown at left, 125%. [Note: Mahra State also issued stamps in 1967, just before being absorbed into the People's Republic of Southern Yemen. These stamps are not listed in the Scott Catalogue. Mi#1

(Michel Catalogue) is shown at right, 80%.]

I currently have the Hadhramaut Sc#29-40 set in my collection under change of government. Given this knew information, I may have to re-think this position.

The Six Plate Varieties of Czech Legion Post #1

An interesting lot of six Czech Legion Post #1 stamps was offered on eBay® last September. The description stated that the lot contained "all six types" of #1. I had never read anywhere that there were six types of the #1 stamp. I became intrigued.

This auction lot reminded me of a discussion I had with David Olson (FICC #1) when he informed me that there were 4 plate varieties of Batum #1 (see page 9 of V13N4). Usually I do not research the technical aspects of stamp production because my interests lie in the historical and political events concurrent with a country needing to issue "new" stamps. But my discussion with Dave nearly a decade ago led me to understand that it was typical "in the old days" for a craftsman to create a single die cast of the stamp. Then that single die was used to created an intermediate matrix or block of stamp images (typically with 4 to 25 images in the block) that was used to create the larger printing plate (used to print the entire sheet). For Batum, the block size was 4. For the Danube Steam Navigation Company of Austria, the block size was 10. And for the Latvia, the block size was 25. [Note, some printing plates had every image created from the same single die, and others had different images for each position on the printing plate (like New Caledonia #1).] Students of the process often describe small differences among the images in the intermediate matrix that were each reproduced multiple times in the full sheet. I still tend not to distinguish the #1s from each other by these intermediate block positions, but having the knowledge can never hurt one's collecting passions.

The auction listing showed nice, high resolution scans of the front and of the back of the six stamps (all perf 13.75 reprints) and also a scan of a page from a book or article that showed detailed differences among the six types for each of the #1, #2 and #3 stamps from that set.

The lot was not very expensive, so I purchased it. I also downloaded the scan from the auction listing showing the differences among the 6 types so I could refer to it later. Shown below is the portion of that scan that shows the differences for Czech Legion Post

#1s. I do not know the source from which this image was taken or I would give them credit for the research. The words indicate the source was a book or article written in the Czech language. Here are mv descriptions for the words and pictures shown.



- Type 1: This type is very similar to type 5. ["1 bod" translates as "1 dot" in type !, and "2 body" is 2 dots in type 5.] My own inspection indicates the middle dot is small and very close to the mosque on its right in type 1 while this dot is larger and located more centrally in the space in type 5.
- Type 2: A period following the word "Posta" in the text. In all other types, there is no period.
- Type 3: A break on the left side of the serpentine line above the triangles. In all other types, the serpentine line is unbroken.
- Type 4: The left upright of the "A" in "VOJENSKA" extends downward so that it is flush with the bottom of the other letters. In all other types, the left leg of the "A" stops above the bottom of the "K".
- Type 5: See description of Type 1.
- Type 6: There is a large white area to the right of the bottom edge of the building.

As stated above, the six stamps I bought in the lot were all perf 13.75 reprints/remainders. In addition, I have full sets (#1-3) of the imperf and of the perf 11.5 stamps. This plate variety information appears to also apply to these original printings.
