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A Note From the WebMaster

Jesper Andersen (#169) designed and built the FICC web site. The site contained the all-important FICC Catalog of 779 entries and around 120 detail pages. When Jesper stepped down as Webmaster, I (Nick Blackburn, FICC #181) eventually took over. In late 2015, I set to work on the task of finishing the detail pages and bringing the site up-to-date. The progress so far is:

- There are two versions of the site coexisting at firstissues.org. Click New or Old to switch between them.
- The Journal Index has been updated. This is accessed from the Journal page of the New version.
- A start has been made on the additional detail pages. Those for the first two Catalogue pages (1840-59 and 1860-70) are complete.



• A feature has been added, listing entries by **Category**, for example South America, or Portuguese Colonies. There is now a Category button in the header menu of the New version.

Completing all the detail pages will take quite some time and members are invited to help, although how this would be organized is uncertain.

One thing we do need to decide on is how to get the Forum going again. The old forum entries were lost when the site crashed in 2009. Jesper managed to restore older entries from a 2007 backup but the Forum has crashed again. It has been suggested that we try a simpler approach such as a Yahoo Group or similar. It is a debate the Club should have and, ironically, it would be very useful to have an online Forum to discuss how to have a Forum.

The First Issues of Dhar

[With permission of the author, this article was extracted from his article appearing in V50/N1 of **INDIA POST**. The original article discussed all five denominations of Dhar's first issue; this article provides only the information related to Sc#1 and 1b. All items pictured in this article are taken from the author's five-frame exhibit entitled **DHAR PHILATELY**.]

Background: Dhar, an Indian Feudatory State (Kingdom), sometimes also referred to as a Native State or a Princely State was located in the Malwa region of Central India. Its size was approximately 1775 sq. miles with a population of 140,000 (in 1901). It was in a treaty relation with the British Government from 1819. Dhar was one of 38 States which issued its own postage stamps and postal stationery from 1897 until 1901 when the State Postal System was taken over by the Imperial Post (British India) rendering Dhar's stamps and postal stationery obsolete as of 31 March, 1901.

Being a small state in both size and population and having a very high illiteracy rate, there was very little private mail which would have required stamps - official mail did not require to be franked with postage stamps until 1901.

Stamps: In June 1897, a set of three values was issued: 1/2 dabal (1/4 anna, Sc#1), 1/2 anna (Sc#3) & 1 anna (Sc#4) which was followed by the addition of 1/4 anna (Sc#2) & 2 annas (Sc#5) in 1900. These stamps were set up from Printer's type (typeset) and consist of the words "POST STATE DHAR" in Nagri (native Hindi) in the upper portion and the value in the lower portion of the stamp. Around the inscriptions, and between the upper and lower portions are the lines of printer's rule, and around the whole is a frame of ornaments. The corner ornaments consist of spades, and between these are ornaments resembling an ornamental "A", four on top and bottom and five on each side. The normal position of the spade is stalk to the center, and the ornamental "A" is normally placed with the feet inward. *[Editor: It is easier for me to visualize the ornaments as alternating complete and incomplete circles – with the incomplete/broken area to the outside.]* All stamps were impressed with an oval hand-stamp control mark in black color reading "PURSHOTTAM RANGNATH" the Superintendent Post.

Printing: This type remained assembled during the entire period of production being amended as necessary to print the different values. During the printing and during amendments of values, the types would often get loose / fall out and were sometimes inserted back incorrectly in inverted or transposed positions. It is the variations in the positions of these ornaments which distinguish the settings of these stamps. It has been generally accepted that 7 main settings exist, with sub-settings due to minor varieties occurring during the printing.

[Editor: The full article shows a table which identifies which of Sc#1-5 were printed with each Setting. In summary, Sc#1 was printed from Settings I, IV-A, IV-B, IV-C, and V. Sc#3 was printed from Settings II, IV-A and IV-C. Sc#4 was printed from Settings III, III-A, IV-A, IV-C and IV-D. Sc#1b was printed from Setting VI. Sc#2 was also printed from Setting VI. Sc#5 was printed from Setting VI.]

Determining Plate Positions: The illustration below shows all ornaments in their normal / correct positions. When numbering the corner spades, we always start at the SW corner and go clockwise. Therefore, we would describe the spades on the illustration below as ABCD. To describe inverted ornaments "A" we would list the ornament number (between 1 - 18). No numbers indicated would imply that they are all in their correct positions, as illustrated at right.

Dhar Follow-up – Plating the Dhar Stamps in my Album

As editor of *FIRST ISSUES*, I have gained extensive background knowledge about many #1s and first-issue sets from the articles submitted for publication. The article by Sandeep Jaiswal on the preceding pages is another that falls into that category.

Before I even began formatting the article to fit the FICC Newsletter layout, I retrieved my album containing the India States and turned to the Dhar set of Sc#1-5 (including #1b). I had never noticed nor even knew to look for corner spades being incorrectly oriented. Or that the ornamental frames were not all uniform. Upon looking, I was surprised to find that only my Sc#4 had "normal" positioning as shown on page 4. My Sc#1, 1b, 2, 3 and 5 all had deviations.

Starting with my Sc#1, I found that ornaments 6, 7, and 8 were inverted – and that the left printer's rule line was extremely weak. This set of findings only matches a stamp from Pos 1/4 of Setting IV-A, IV-B or IV-C. Given the weakness of the left rule line, I'm "guessing" it is Setting IV-B.

Next was #1b where I found ornaments 12, 13 and 14 were inverted. This identifies it as Setting VI, Pos 1/5.

On to #2. Here the spades had an ACCD orientation and there was no stop after the value. Identifying this as Setting VI, Pos 2/4. For #3, ornaments 7, 8 and 9 were inverted and there was no top rule line. Identifying this as Setting IV-C, Pos 1/2.

As stated above, my #4 had all spades oriented correctly, no ornaments were inverted, and all lines / stops in their proper positions. This scenario fits many positions in multiple Settings. So, I was unable to plate my #4.

Finally, #5. The spades were oriented ABCA, and ornaments 7, 8, and 9 were inverted. This identified it as Setting VII, Pos 1/2.

Although none of these plating identifications make my stamps more (or less) valuable, the effort by itself was a great way to enjoy my collection even more.

A variation in Bijawar #1 Paper Color

I recently came across a Bijawar Sc#1 that made me take a second look. The paper is brownish-red in color (the same color as the ink) and the gum is clear and smooth. My personal copy is on white/cream paper with brushed gum that is cracked. The vignette is identical on both stamps as are the perforations. Both stamps are shown at right (125%). The backs of the same two stamps are shown below left (100%).



I looked in my Gibbons catalogue, but saw no reference to paper / gum variations – or to reprints of this stamp – or to fugitive ink issues. An authority on Bijawar stamps looked at scans of the stamps and stated, "the uneven color on

the back of the stamp leads me to conclude it may have been exposed to outside elements / chemicals or exposed to steam vapor as the ink has definitely run and bled. That would also explain the difference in gum condition."
