Changing topics, there have been two very large stamp shows in the USA since our last Newsletter went to press – the World Stamp Show 2016 in New York in June and the APS StampShow in Portland in August. There was some interest among members to try and "meet up" at WSS, and I hope that happened. After the show ended, I sent a few members an email asking them to provide a brief summary of their experiences. Two responses were:

- While every aspect of the New York show was well done and worth taking time to sample, the 4500 frames of competitive exhibits was THE outstanding feature for me; followed closely by the chance to connect with friends and acquaintances, both collectors and dealers, from around the world. A nice bonus was finding a US #834a, the \$5 red brown Prexie, misidentified as a normal carmine, in the stock of a foreign dealer! - I spent three full days at the WSS-NY show (most of the time at a single dealer who had brought a monumental stock of worldwide stamps). It was quite exciting to be there, especially in light of the substantial disappearance of local stamp shows in recent years. It was impressive to see such a massive concentration of philatelic vitality: people of all ages, extensive attendance from abroad, hundreds of dealers, thousands of exhibits, and amazing rarities on display. 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The First Issues of France

[For further information on distinguishing the France Sc#1, 6 and 7 issues from the Bordeaux issues and from the French Colony issues, there is a 2004 article on page 3 of **FIRST ISSUES** V12N4 that provides more information on these comparisons. The author of that article, "Napolean", was an APS expert for these issues (at that time) and preferred to remain anonymous.]

France issued its first stamps during the period between Jan. 1849 and Dec. 1850. They came following a reform of the postal system announced on Aug. 8, 1848 that instituted new postal rates and called for the introduction of stamps. These changes were to take effect on Jan. 1st 1849. The ministry of finance decided that the new stamps were to be rectangular in shape and had to represent the republic. Jean-Jacques Barre who was chief engraver at the mint submitted his proposal that was adopted. He chose a profile portrait of the roman goddess of agriculture and abundance, Ceres, as a personification of the republic hence the name of this issue. A single master die was used for all denominations, 2 small removable studs were used at the bottom to insert the value. Anatole Hulot was responsible for the production of the printing plates using the process of electroplating. 2 panes of 150 subjects (10H x 15V) were joined to create a sheet of 300 stamps. During the production of the plates some subjects were inadvertently joined to the others upside down creating tête-bêche pairs for all values except the 40 c. At that time, when stamp collecting did not really exist, it didn't seem to bother anybody so the mistakes were not corrected and major rarities were created. The printing of the stamps was done by Tacquin at the Paris mint.

First issued were the 20 c. black (Sc#3), the standard rate for a single letter of no more than 7.5 g and the 1 fr. vermillion (Sc#8) for items between 15 and 100 g. The other denominations gradually followed as detailed in the table below with Sc#1 being the last issued. [The Figure below the table shows the stamps (150%) in the order issued.]

As early as Jan. 1849, it was realized that the 20 c. black stamp posed a problem. It was sometimes difficult to distinguish the black cancel so it was decided to change the colour to blue. Printing of the 20 c. blue (Sc#4) began on 4/7/1849 but the authorities chose to clear the stock of the remaining black stamps before issuing them. In May 1850 the printing of the 20 c. blue stopped, the rate for single letters was raised to 25 c. starting 7/1/1850 so the production of a new 25 c. blue stamp was rushed to meet the deadline

and all but a few of the 22 996 000 already printed 20 c. blue along with the remaining 20 c. black stamps were incinerated. A " 25^{c} ." surcharge in red on the blue stamps was proposed but the essay was not adopted. A single one of these original essays of 1850 is thought to have escape destruction and for a while resided in the famous Ferrari collection (unlisted in Scott). A rare constant variety of the 40 c. exists known as type II (Sc#7b). When assembling the 40 c. plate, two 20 c. clichés were placed by mistake in position 146 and 147, the error was corrected by hand and the "4" differs in shape. The Figure at right (enlarged) shows detail of a pair with Type I at left and II at right.



The key stamp in the set is the 1 fr. vermillion (Sc#8), it is the single most valuable French stamp. It was withdrawn early and replaced by the carmine stamp because of the possible confusion with the 40 c. orange which was planned for early 1850. The stamp also exists in a paler shade of vermillion (Sc#8c) and is known as the Vervelle stamp for the name of the stamp dealer who bought half a sheet of them found in the estate of Anatole Hulot in 1892. Always found mint without gum, they are thought to be trial color essays and, although very expansive, are worth much less than the deeper shade stamps.

Stamps of the first issue should not be confused with stamps of the same design produced later. In a letter dated Feb. 5, 1862 the son of Rowland Hill requested copies of the first French stamps for his father's collection. It was then realized that none had been



saved so Anatole Hulot was requested to reprint the stamps to create an official state collection. $14\frac{1}{2}$ sheets (4350 stamps) of all values were reprinted including the unissued 20 c. blue stamp. They were printed in lighter shades of colour on a different paper. A different gum was also used. The 1 fr. was printed in a pale lake colour and interestingly some essays with the red 25^{c} . surcharge were also produced. All

but one of these rare essays on the market today comes from this 1862 reprint. Some stamps were archived, others destroyed, but many made it to the philatelic market and are highly sought after today. Above left is a Figure showing reprints of Sc#1, 4 & 6 (200%). At right is a Figure (200%) of a 25 c. essay (Yvert # 8A) from an auction house website which sold for \in 13,277 in a French auction in May 2016.



During the war with Prussia (1870-1871) there was a shortage of stamps in the unoccupied French regions. Paris, where stamps were printed, was under siege so the provisional government authorized the

production of stamps of the Ceres type in the city of Bordeaux. This Bordeaux issue (Sc#38-48) was produced by lithography instead of typography and small differences in design make them relatively easy to recognize. The Figure at left (200%) shows Sc#42 (taken from the web).

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and Sc#14 (40 c. orange). They are worth much less than the 1849-1850 stamps so if you are not sure what you have or are being offered professional opinion should be sought. Shown at right (200%) is French Colonies Sc#9. [Picture taken from the

Finally, between 1871-1872 some stamps of similar design and colours were also printed for the French colonies. They are French colonies Sc#9 (10 c. bister), Sc#11 (20 c. blue), Sc#12 (25 c. blue)

As a final note, it is interesting to see that these beautiful stamps were an inspiration for another first issue by the Argentine province of Corrientes in 1856. Shown at left (200%) is Corrientes Sc#1.

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Featured Auction Lots – Afghanistan #1

As stated in *First Issues* V23N4, the Scott catalogues now have a listing for Afghanistan #1. This stamp is just like the Sc#2 stamps except that the diameter is 30mm. [The diameter of Sc#2-4 is approximately 26-27 mm.] The 30mm Sc#1 is from Plate 1 of the printings. According to articles I have read, these stamps are much more scarce than would be indicated by the price assigned in the Scott Catalogues. Personally, I cannot verify the relative scarcity versus #2-4 as I find it difficult to encounter any of these issues (Sc#1-4) for sale from any dealer or in any auctions. ... That said, there are 4 used copies of the Afghanistan Sc#1 stamp listed in the current auction (page 7). All have been verified as having a 30mm diameter. Although none are close to pristine condition, the minimum bids set in the auction are very fair (if not generous) for this elusive stamp.



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Web Site News

The online version has all the links already in place, so all you have to do is click on one of the underlined words/phrases and you will be transported to that section of the web site.

EXHIBITS: The exhibits pages were developed just in time for the previous issue (V24N3). These are designed to feature displays too long to be shown entirely in the Newsletter. Consideration was given to the intellectual property rights of the exhibit owners, so the resolution of the displays is good enough to view on screen but not good enough to download and republish by a site visitor. The pdf download capability is restricted to members by password. Members must contact Nick Blackburn (webmaster@firstissues.org) to get the login and password for downloading these.

WEB SITE CATALOGUE PROGRESS: In the last three months, the detail pages for <u>Europe</u>, <u>South America</u>, <u>Central &</u> <u>North America</u>, and <u>Asia</u> have been completed. In the countries category, that leaves just the <u>Middle East</u> (in progress at the time of this writing) and <u>Africa</u>. Concentrating on sub-groups in this way has made the job easier in that just a few catalogues are needed at one time. The current plan is to continue after that with <u>French Colonies</u> and <u>Indian States</u>, at which point <u>Page 3 of the web site catalogue</u> should be easy to complete.

FORUM: No suggestions were forthcoming from the membership on setting up a new FORUM (see the request in the last issue of the Newsletter). An FICC <u>Google Chat Group</u> has been set up to give that service a try and, if it meets our needs, all members for whom FICC has an email address will be invited to join. [*Editor: This is very much like our former web site FORUM. Think of it as a Bulletin Board in which you can post your comments or questions and receive replies from other members. Several topic areas have already been created. Unlike the previous FORUM where you had to log onto the FICC web site to see if there were any new posts, this new version delivers the new postings to you in your email inbox. However, you must log onto the web site to reply.]*

WAY BACK MACHINE: The <u>WayBackMachine</u> has been making periodic backups of the FICC web site since October 2002. Some of these backups include parts of the previous FORUM discussions prior to the site crash – although the topic replies are incomplete. Nevertheless, the WBM archives give us a flavor of those discussions: <u>this link is from 2006</u>. I have also nominated the FICC site for the <u>British Library's Archive</u>.

SOURCES: As previously reported, the <u>Journal Index</u> has been brought up to date. I normally read the Journal (Newsletter) on paper, but Kurt Streepy supplied copies on CD for building the index. That has been a revelation - \$10 for a full set of all Newsletters on a CD is a great value for anyone with an interest in stamps and an absolute bargain for first issues collectors. It is proving a valuable resource in writing the detail pages in the web site Catalogue. [Colnect is a useful secondary source of stamp images.]

TRAFFIC COUNTER: A <u>Flag Counter</u> has been added to the web site to log the numbers and locations of visitors. Visit additions are triggered only when someone visits one of four pages (<u>Home</u>, <u>Exhibitions</u>, <u>Forum</u>, and this update page). Repeat visits in the same month (from the same computer/device) are not double-counted. According to <u>WorthOfWeb</u>, the FICC web site is worth \$58. It adds that this evaluation is 893 days old, but cannot be recalculated because our Alexa rank has fallen below 30 million. <u>FreeSiteWorth</u> puts the value at \$741.

Norfolk Island Stops Issuing Stamps

As reported in the August 1, 2016 edition of Linn's Stamp News, Norfolk Islands discontinued issuing its own stamps on July 1, 2016. Australia Post will now provide Norfolk's postage stamps. The article stated that stamps will be inscribed with "Norfolk Island, Australia" similar to the stamps that Australia Post issues for the Australian Antarctic Territory, Christmas Island and Cocos Islands. For those FICC members who collect "change in government" stamps, you may want to consider obtaining Norfolk's first two stamps by Australia Post (issued in September) depicting the retailed tropicbird and the masked booby.
